# INTRODUCTION

What does it mean for an archive to be alive? Not a repository of the past, sealed and static – but a system that breathes, transforms, and produces new knowledge through the people, communities, and technologies that engage with it?

This symposium takes that question as its starting point. Hosted at the Africa Museum in Tervuren, it brings together artists, researchers, and cultural organizations involved in two European initiatives: S+T+ARTS Afropean Intelligence and S+T+ARTS Buen TEK – projects that have, over the past 18 months, fostered collaboration between Africa, South America, and Europe.

Both projects are rooted in a conviction that innovation does not begin with technology alone. Afropean Intelligence asks what artificial intelligence looks like when developed from and for African communities. Buen TEK explores how artistic and technological practices in South America can engage with ecological knowledge, territorial practices, and indigenous worldviews. Together, they demonstrate that archives of local knowledge – when activated through art, technology, and collective practice – become tools for social justice, ecological resilience, and more inclusive forms of innovation.

The program brings these practices into dialogue through presentations by participating artists and researchers, followed by roundtable discussions with cultural actors from Africa and Europe, alongside policymakers, technologists, and scholars. These conversations will ask what can be learned from these collaborations, what challenges they have surfaced, and how they might point toward more sustainable and context-sensitive forms of knowledge-making.

Contemporary AI systems rely heavily on datasets that extract and standardise knowledge. Many indigenous knowledge systems, however, operate differently – through relational, embodied and iterative forms of memory, where knowledge is not simply stored but performed, carried and continuously reinterpreted.

This panel brings together artistic research projects that engage with these tensions. Rather than asking how ancestral knowledge can be translated into data, they explore how such knowledge systems can question and reimagine the underlying logic of datasets and AI models.

**12:00-12:30** **Lecture-performance – *Decoding Egwu* by Emmanuel Ndefo (Nigeria) & Dan Xu (China)**

Many forms of cultural knowledge are transmitted through dance, ritual and social practice rather than written sources. This lecture-performance explores how artists engage with embodied knowledge and experiment with strategies to document, translate or activate such practices through artistic and technological means.

## **13:15-14:15** Debate – *What have we learned? Critical Reflections from the S+T+ARTS Afropean Intelligence Programme*

What happens when artists, researchers and local communities in Africa and Europe think together about artificial intelligence – not as users of a ready-made technology, but as co-shapers of it? This session looks back on eighteen months of S+T+ARTS Afropean Intelligence: what the programme made possible, where it met its limits, and what unexpected opportunities it opened up.

Participants share their experiences around building cross-sectoral infrastructures for collaboration in Africa, the challenges of transnational partnership, technological sovereignty, and the question of how arts-driven research can contribute to imagining new futures.

This session brings together the practices of artists who shape new archives through participation, co-creation and storytelling – archives rooted in local values, governed by the people they concern, and that do not preserve the past but actively co-shape the present.

**16:15-17:15** **Debate — *Creative Alliances: How can Europe build reciprocal and equitable cultural partnerships?***

Building on the experiences of the day, this session asks how European cultural and innovation policy can structurally contribute to more reciprocal and sustainable global partnerships. Can the knowledge generated through initiatives like S+T+ARTS Afropean Intelligence and S+T+ARTS Buen TEK offer value beyond European borders? And how do we move away from a vision of cultural exchange that risks reproducing western logics toward one where innovation genuinely flows in both directions?

With contributions from the academic, cultural and policy field, this debate explores what conditions – institutional, financial, and political – are needed to make truly reciprocal partnerships possible.

S+T+ARTS is an initiative of the European Commission (DG CNECT) to foster alliances between science, technology and the arts, in order to cultivate technological innovation centered on human needs and values. Since its inception, STARTS has grown into a dynamic ecosystem of more than 150 institutions accross Europe, jointly fostering transdisciplinary collaboration between art, science and technology. Oer the past decade it has supported hundreds of residencies, large-scale collaborations, and international projects that demonstrate the transformative power of embedding creativity and critical reflection at the core of European research and innovation.

## + AFROPEAN INTELLIGENCE

Afropean Intelligence mobilises art as a space for research and reinvention of technologies. It critically explores artificial intelligence through Afro-European perspectives, supporting practices that intersect ancestral knowledge, local cultures and digital tools to challenge dominant narratives and propose situated alternatives. ## + BUEN TEK

Bringing together ancestral knowledge systems and contemporary technological and artistic practices, Buen-TEK reflects on how culturally grounded innovation can respond to today's socio-environmental challenges. Rooted in the principles of Buen Vivir and Lo-TEK, and shaped through 18 months of collaboration across South America and Europe, including 10 artistic residencies, community workshops, and material experimentation, it foregrounds grassroots and community-led ways of doing, ecological awareness, and context-sensitive approaches to science and technology. By fostering dialogue across disciplines and geographies, it invites alternative models of collaboration beyond extractive frameworks, embracing reciprocity, adaptability, and collective care as conditions for more just and resilient futures. → [www.starts.eu/what-we-do/buen-tek/](http://www.starts.eu/what-we-do/buen-tek/)
